GCS FAST FACTS

Vote Yes for Education

On November 4, Guilford County voters will be asked to consider a ¼ cent increase in the county sales tax. The increase would generate up to \$14 million annually for Guilford County Schools.

Where the money would go

- If approved, revenue generated by the ¼ cent sale tax increase would be used to
- Keep more teacher and teacher assistants in our classrooms
 - Purchase classroom supplies like paper, markets, paint, beakers, books and instructional technology
 - Repair and maintain aging facilities

Why more money is needed

Education funding has been cut by more than \$500 million statewide since 2008, even after adjusting for inflation. State cuts to GCS exceed \$46.6 million.

State cuts have caused damage

- GCS has had to cut 409 full time positions since 2008. Fewer teachers = more overcrowded classes and fewer course offerings.
- Textbook funding has dropped from \$67/child in 2008 to \$14/child in 2014.
- State funding for teacher training has dropped from \$85 per teacher in 2008 to \$0 in 2014.

Maintenance needs are piling up

- GCS has 16 cents per square foot for maintenance and routine repairs.
- 50% of GCS buildings are 50+ years old.
- Lottery proceeds go to State and County governments. Guilford County uses it for debt service on the 2008 school bonds.

Sales tax makes sense

Up to 40% of the revenue raised from the sale tax - \$4.8 million annually – will be paid by visitors who do not live in Guilford County.

- The sales tax won't be charged on basic necessities such as unprepared food, prescription medicine or gasoline.
- The cost to the consumer is minimal – about 1 penny on a fast-food hamburger purchase.
- If approved, the Guilford County sales tax would increase from 6.75 cents per dollar to 7 cents per dollar, still below the previous rate of 7.75 cents per dollar.
